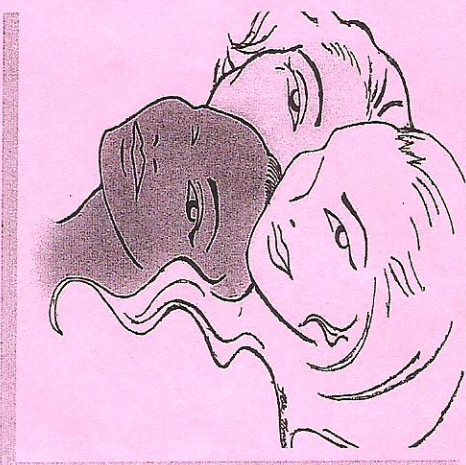

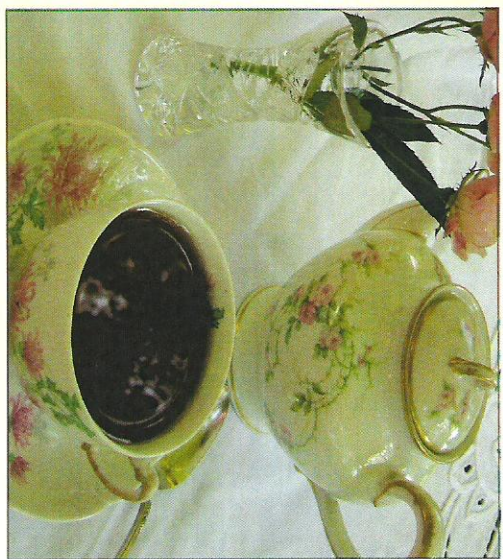

#### WHY DO WE CALL IT THE PINK TEA?

At the time the 19th Amendment was being debated throughout this country, women had few places they could go unchaperoned, however, one place was to tea. Tea was an intimate setting, usually in someone's home, so women felt comfortable asking questions and getting answers in a small group away from the prying ears and eyes of their husbands, and even their mothers.

At Suffrage Rallies large groups of women and men attended, often with people who were against suffrage and harassed the speakers. Women who were against suffrage often gave out pink roses making a silent protest at these rallies.

Suffragettes turned that idea on end. If a woman was invited to a Pink Tea, guests knew that the subject spoken about would be Suffrage and the passing of the 19th Amendment.

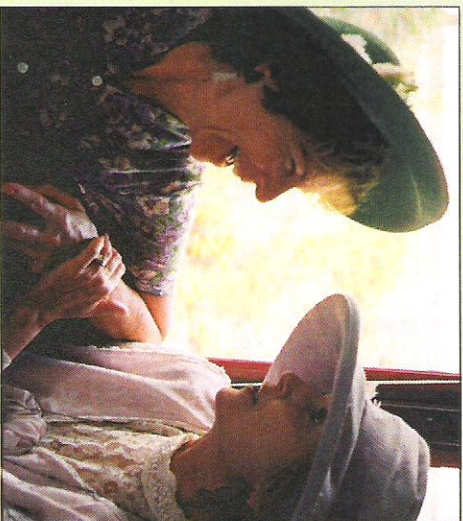

# The Beginnings



Back in 2004, Angela Estrada (owner of The Haven - a gallery that was located on 5th Avenue in Mount Dora) and Margaret Andersen - both new to Mount Dora - sat down for a cup of tea one afternoon and began talking about what was going on in the summer in Mount Dora.

They both thought an event of some kind would be good to get the town out of "summer mode". Both women were pretty independent women and thought something around Women's Equality Day (August 26) would be an excellent date to celebrate.

At the same time Angela's niece was suffering from cancer and the conversation would sometimes be centered around that unfortunate theme.

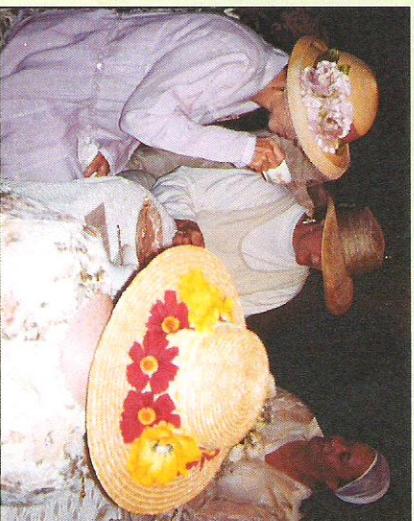
In the meantime, Margaret discovered there was no fund for free and/or low cost mammograms in northern Lake County for local women. Both women decided that the proceeds from the event would go to start a fund that would help women in our area with mammograms... even if they could not afford it or had no insurance.

The first event raised over \$800.00! As the MC of the event, Margaret stood in front of a group of 65 women at First Presbyterian Church of Mount Dora and could envision the entire room filled. That first event found all the food donated, a pianist came forward and began to play the piano during the event, and then a singer came forward and sang for us as well. All pretty spontaneous. But the women themselves felt it was something that should happen every year, that we should come together as a community of women to help each other.

So, a committee of four came together and decided to keep this fund going year after year. There is a need and the women in this community come together every year to meet it.

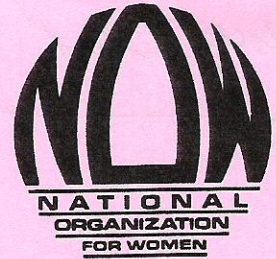

Proceeds will go into a fund for women in northern Lake County who can't afford mammograms.

Gwendolyn Manning, former Eustis city commissioner and retired elementary school teacher, Judi Phillips Jones, president of the Lake County chapter of NOW (National Organization for Women), a nonpartisan organization of women and men dedicated to working toward equality for women, will be the guest speakers.

Manning will portray anti-slavery heroine Harriet Tubman, one of the most famous conductors on the Underground Railroad. Tubman helped more than 300 slaves flee from the South to freedom in the North.

Jones, who is retired senior research analyst, will speak on "Waves of Women Working for Equality," an overview of the history of American women seeking equality through political power.

A quilt made by members of the Lake County Quilt Guild, will be auctioned at the event.

In the late 19th century, when suffragettes were recruiting women to the cause, an invitation to a Pink Tea was a code phrase that suffrage would be discussed.
